FOIP Act and Regulation

Revised Statutes of Alberta (RSA)

A revision of the Statutes of Alberta is currently under way and it is expected to have an in force date of January 1, 2002. Most of the sections of the *FOIP Act* will be re-numbered to reflect amendments made as of January 2000.

Information & Privacy Commissioner Investigation Report

The following Investigation Report was released on July 20, 2001 and provides a definition of the meaning of “managing personnel” and “administering personnel” for the purposes of section 38(1)(v) and by implication, section 33(1)(j) of the *FOIP Act*.

Investigation Report 2001-IR-006, University of Alberta

The University of Alberta (U of A) was contracting out a systems function to two private companies. An employee of the U of A provided one of the companies with a set of spreadsheets containing employment information for certain U of A employees the company was considering hiring. The U of A stated that the information was disclosed so that the company could make comparable or better employment offers to those employees. Three of the employees complained that their salary information had been disclosed to the company in violation of the privacy provisions contained in Part 2 of the *FOIP Act*.

The U of A submitted that disclosure of the salary information was authorized for the purpose of managing or administering personnel (section 38(1)(v)). The complainants argued that the disclosure had prejudiced their ability to negotiate with the company and that this was the kind of disclosure that Part 2 of the *Act* was intended to prevent.

The Portfolio Officer determined that the disclosure of the personal information was not authorized by section 38(1)(v) of the *Act*, which permits disclosure for the purpose of managing or administering the personnel of the public body. The disclosure was not for the purpose of *managing* personnel because it was not related to the duties and responsibilities of the complainants.

The disclosure was also not for the purpose of *administering* personnel because it did not relate to staffing at the U of A, to classification or compensation, to a program of occupational health or safety, or to training and development. Although the disclosure might have had a link to budget and payroll planning, these were functions of finance within the organizational structure, not personnel administration. The disclosure appeared to have been made to address the personnel management purposes of the company and the financial purposes of the U of A.

Changes at IMAP

Sue Kessler has assumed the position of Director, Information Management Branch within IMAP. Sue will take the lead with the Office of the Chief Information Officer for the cross-government information management initiative, as well as responsibility for the government's records management program, and assist with the planning the next legislative review of the *FOIP Act*.

Speaking of Statistics

In the 2000/2001 fiscal year local public bodies received 633 FOIP requests. Compare this to the 2161 received by government ministries. Of the 633 requests, 61% were requests for personal information, 37% were requests for general information, and the remaining 2% were requests for correction of personal information.

Applicants requesting general information are the general public (54%), followed by businesses (19%), interest groups (13%), the media (12%) and researchers (2%). Health care bodies received the majority of requests (34%), followed by local government bodies (25%), police services (23%), school jurisdictions (9%), and post-secondary institutions (7%). Housing management bodies, police commissions, and public libraries received the remainder (2%).
